FOREWORD

Conservation of Moose membership is everybody's business, especially if you are an officer of a lodge. The necessity of some program to assist with the job of retaining members in good standing in their lodge, was the reason for the establishment of the membership Conservation Committee. Much has been accomplished by this program, but in some way it has lacked the full cooperation needed to get the job done.

The new MOOSE CONSERVATION program still may not be the answer. As a Governor, charged with the responsibility of leading your lodge to new heights; as a Conservation Chairman, believing in the value of Moose membership and with a desire to assist your Lodge and your Governor; or as just a willing worker, we ask that you read the following programs and ideas and try them before passing judgment.

All ideas, changes, and rules, have been suggested by members of lodge Conservation Committees. Put them to work exactly as outlined and the results will be readily apparent to you and to us. Our entire facilities and staff are here to serve you. Make us a part of your problem. Remember "a burden heavy to one, is borne lightly by many."

CONSERVATION THRU EDUCATION AND INTEREST

Believing that our continued loss of interest and resultant lapsation of membership comes from a lack of proper indoctrination to the principles and precepts of the Loyal Order of Moose, let us first ask ourselves a few questions. Is the sponsor of each new member asked to be present for the enrollment of his candidates? If he cannot or will not be present, is someone appointed to be the acting sponsor? Is the new member introduced to all the officers and members? If a lunch is to be served, is the new member placed first in line or served first? Are all candidates properly identified as such by a lapel tag, a flower, or some distinguishing item? Does some one explain your local lodge program of meeting and activities and the National program of Civic Affairs and protection? Do you use the indoctrination letter available from the Enrollment Department?

If you can answer yes to all or nearly all of these questions, your lodge is without a doubt, very successful. If your answer is no the following new program is very worthwhile, easy to set up, and will help you get a job done.

MOOSE GREETING COMMITTEE

This committee should be of three to five members (large lodges would have more), named to serve as official "greeters". They will greet new candidates at the Enrollment Ceremonies, be assigned to serve on special occasions such as anniversarys, booster nights, etc. So they may be recognized, an "Official Moose Greeter" badge is available from the Supply Department.

For Enrollments, two phases would occur. **FIRST PHASE:** Prior to the day or evening of enrollment, the Secretary will give each "Greeter" the name of one or more new candidates. The "Greeter" should contact the sponsor to be sure his candidate will be present. If transportation is needed, this should also be arranged with the sponsor.

On the day or evening of enrollment, "Greeters" should be present and available at the entrance to the lodge home. As each new candidate appears, an identifying item should be affixed to his coat, he should be ushered to the Secretaries office to complete his preenrollment duties and then introduced to all officers and members present. **IF THE SPONSOR IS NOT PRESENT,** some "Greeter" should be appointed to stay with him continuously until the meeting is called. During this time you can show him your lodge home, acquaint him with your activities and be sure he understands the protection provided by his Moose membership. (A sociable drink might be in order, but no new candidate should be under the influence of liquor.) Advise the new candidate what he is to do, where he will sit and remind him that you will see him immediately following the ceremony. At the conclusion of the meeting you will again be the host to these men who are now your Brothers. If the Secretary has the dues receipts made out, be sure your new Brother has his presented, if a lunch is to be served, escort him to the honored place in the line or at the tables. Remember, this is his big night. Make him proud of his new Brothers and his new fraternity. Finally, make an appointment to meet him in his home with his family. You should not emphasize the need for Conservation as this may lead to a negative reaction by the new member.

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SECOND PHASE: This is probably the most important item we have been neglecting in our work. Fullfill your appointment previously made with the new member and his family by meeting them in their home. Go over the Welcome Packet (This may have been presented at the Enrollment, if not, do so now), be sure the wife understands the protection she now has. Have them read the booklets and the questions and answers. Tell them the story of Mooseheart and Moosehaven and if you have, or had, a family at Mooseheart, be sure to dwell on this. Point out that they are assisting in the care of these children and aged now, as they would be cared for by other members in their need.

If the new member cannot find within your present activity schedule the program he is interested in, perhaps he would be willing to be the Chairman of some new idea. If your lodge has a bulletin, be sure he is given one and tell him he will also soon receive the national magazine, and if he does not, let the Secretary know about it.

Present the program of the Women of the Moose and inform the wife she is now eligible to join, but is not required to do so to enjoy her husbands Moose membership privileges.

Explain their responsibilities of membership. Acquaint the new member with the distribution of his yearly dues. (The ABCD, General Fund, and Benefit Fund dues if you are a benefit lodge). Ask his help in extending the defending circle of the Moose by inviting some friend or friends to become members. Leave a few applications, but remind him of the ritual portion "I will never propose an unworthy person for membership", instead, asking men of sound back-

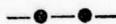

ground and good faith. Explain how your investigating committee works.

In bidding good night, tell the new member you would like to pick him up on the next regular meeting night. Extend an invitation to them to be sure to attend the next social function. If you know the Moose program and have done all of these things, we sincerely believe you will have done a major job in preventing the possible future lapsation of this new member.

If you were to be enrolled, wouldn't you like this kind of attention?

WANDERING MOOSE PROGRAM

There is a large segment of our Moose membership that are the forgotten Brothers, in most instances. These are the members of any lodge that have moved from the community where they originally belonged to a lodge. The Circulation Department at Mooseheart is continually setting up change of addresses for Moose Magazine mailing. A check of these out of town members indicates that sooner or later, these men drop their membership. They get away from association with a lodge and it is easy to forget to keep their dues paid.

Our first approach to this member was in the form of a "Wandering Moose" card, made up by the Circulation Department when a change of address was reported to them. To sort these down to usable lists required a lot of hand work in the Conservation Department office and was recently discontinued. A new approach will be a card sent direct to

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the member who is moving, asking him to check the local phone book for the address of the local lodge. Where he cannot find a lodge close, he may return the card to Mooseheart for the address of the nearest lodge at which time a letter will be sent to the Secretary of some lodge near the "Wandering" Brother's home.

Put yourself in this Brothers situation. If you were to move to a new town, wouldn't you appreciate getting acquainted with the people of this new city? What better way to get a Brother Moose interested in your community, your lodge, than to show an interest in his future and a quick introduction to the membership of your lodge.

Just inviting the visiting Moose to your lodge is not the complete answer. Do you have a lodge Activity program which will offer some inducement to the visitor to want to return to your quarters? Are your quarters clean and inviting, your Stewards, Doormen, and other help the friendly type who will make the new visitor want to return? Take a good look at your own operation before you ask a visiting Brother to make your lodge his "Second Home".

IDEAS FOR MOOSE ACTIVITIES

All lodges have received a booklet on ideas which can be used to promote interest. Just having social quarters available is only the beginning. You must promote all kinds of entertainment, socials, sports, dances, educational ideas, if you hope to keep the new and old members active and working in your lodge. The ideas as outlined are all in actual use somewhere in our fraternity. They require very little actual

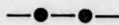

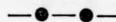

outlay of cash, but do require planning and help, to complete the idea. If you do not have one of these booklets available, please let us know.

GET ACQUAINTED PARTY

Of all the aids offered by the Conservation Department, none has been as well accepted as the "Get Acquainted Packet" and party. It is a perfect tie in with the urgent need for proper education and indoctrination in the Loyal Order of Moose. This idea should not only be continued, it should be more highly stressed by each "Greeter" in all his contacts with the new member.

At the time of the house call by the official "Greeter", the packet and the material contained within should be thoroughly discussed with the new member and his family. Your lodge should have made announcement of the date of the next "Get Acquainted Party" and you should inform the new member he is expected to bring his wife so that she too may get acquainted with the organization. We must again emphasize the importance of having some one make a thorough explanation of the local and national Moose programs, the protection provided to the member and his family through Moose membership and the activities available. If you have one or more members who has visited Mooseheart and/or Moosehaven, he should be asked to give a first hand report of his visit.

Be sure to go over the Activity Preference form, which is a part of the Welcome Packet. Find out what this family would like to do. If it is not available, now is the time to

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ask him for his suggestions and ask if he would be willing to chairman that program. Thank him for his idea and point out that through many people working together, we can help to build a better world and a better Fraternity. It is also suggested that this is the time to make a note of the number and ages of all children in the family. Also birth dates, as this would be of very great assistance in setting up a Birthday party within the lodge.

Always emphasize our desire to be of assistance to children's welfare and safety. This is of major importance to any family man and could be the means of solidifying his membership.

REMEMBER, someone had to tell this member to sell him. If we now prove we want him as a member we stand a better chance of keeping him as a good standing member. It is important to bring in new members but it is doubly important to keep old members.

Make them welcome through the "Welcome Packet".

NEW MEMBER RECOGNITION PROGRAM

We have instituted a new award program for everyone interested in assisting the officers to contact members in arrears. It differs from the previous award program a little but rules and procedures are simple. Here they are.

1. Paid employees are not eligible under this program. They still qualify under rules of the Greeter Program. (See "Recognition for Paid Employees").
2. Interest points are given for the collection of *dues in arrears* only.

3. Contact cards must be used for credit. This assures the worker of credit for contacts made and avoids book-keeping on the part of the Secretary.
4. Moose "Saver" books (supplied from the Conservation Dept. at Mooseheart) are used to keep the record of dues collected and must be sent in to receive an award. The first four awards, a matching set of fine leather goods, are sent for 12-24-36-48 points. Future awards will be awarded on a basis of each additional 48 points. One interest point is credited for each quarter of dues in arrears collected and verified by the Secretary. Any member not paid up as of 16th of the month following the end of the dues quarter is in arrears for the current quarter and collection of his dues for the next quarter entitle you to one interest point.
5. Moose "Saver" books are sent direct to each worker. To get this he must make at least one collection of dues in arrears from a Contact Card, detach the top stub (or stubs) and send to the Conservation Department, Mooseheart, Ill.
6. Lodges must agree to participate in this program by sharing in the cost of the awards. A participation pledge form is sent to each Secretary for approval by the officers and lodge. The lodge share is small compared to the value of the goods offered.

It should be stressed here that you should always try to interest the member in paying his dues by the year. Don't sell the lodge, the member or yourself short just to be able to collect arrearage interest points each quarter. Remember Moose protection is not available to the member who is *not in good standing*.

RECOGNITION FOR PAID EMPLOYEES

Recognition for paid employees (Secretary, Steward, Doormen) will be as follows: Paid employees will be eligible for recognition following the end of the fiscal year on April 30th by having served as a "Greeter" in the lodge, collection outside the lodge quarters of at least 5 quarters dues in arrears, assistance with lodge functions and membership promotion and upon certification by the Governor and Conservation Chairman that the employee has been of tremendous assistance in strengthening the defending circle. In addition your lodge must have shown AN INCREASE IN GOOD STANDING members over the preceding April 30th report.

Completion of 1st year	Conservation tie bar, (plain), and Greeter Card.
Completion of 2nd year	Ruby tie bar and Greeter Card.
Completion of 3rd year	Diamond tie bar, and Greeter Card.

Employees who now have a diamond tie bar or higher award will receive a special award. If you now hold only a plain tie bar, you can qualify for the ruby tie bar the first year and the diamond tie bar the 2nd year.

LODGE GREETER BADGES

WILL BE THE PROPERTY OF THE LODGE. To get you started these were furnished by Mooseheart at no cost.

It is our belief that every member of your lodge that attends meetings would like to be able to wear one of these badges during meetings and other lodge functions. The cost to you is small compared to the feeling of "Belonging" that could result from the ability to get acquainted. If your original supply has been misplaced, or you would like extras, additional greeter badges may be purchased from the Supply Dept. at 25¢ each.

SUPPLIES

Your Conservation Department will continue to furnish follow up dues notices, special arrearage letters, and other literature. As new material is available you will receive samples.

DIRECT MAIL PROGRAMS

We are able to offer two types of a direct mail appeal to members in arrears. The first must be handled by your local committee. The second would be direct from Mooseheart.

LOCAL We can supply samples of a series of letters to be printed locally, carrying special appeals to the member in arrears from your lodge and members. There would be no charge to you on this service, and samples will include full instructions. These can be purchased if you prefer. See order blank.

DIRECT FROM MOOSEHEART The regular dues notice would be sent by your Secretary on the 1st of the month prior to the expiration of dues. A new follow up letter would

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also be sent by the secretary on the 15th day of this month. An arrearage notice should be sent on the 1st of the month following the end of the quarter. About the 15th, use the form we will supply and make up a list of the names you want us to contact. This list must then be sent to us and a series of follow ups will be made direct from Mooseheart. Since this will entail considerable time and expense by us, we must make a charge for postage and cost of supplies used. If you were to mail these locally you would have the same expense of postage and mailing, so your extra cost would be very small, if any. Full explanation will accompany request for this service.

SPECIAL LODGE RECOGNITION AWARDS

Any lodge desiring to do so, may offer special awards to Conservation workers. If this is your desire, we recommend using official items. We will supply you with the necessary record and division cards to carry on as in the past. If you plan to do this, please advise us so we can furnish these assists. We have available the following items to present:

The purpose of this Booklet is to acquaint you with The Lodges in The Northeast Moose Association.

It is hoped that you will plan to visit as many as you can on your tour of Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire.

The Welcome Mat is out at all Lodges.

Go through your file of these—check your phone book, city directory and the original sponsor to see if the applicant still lives in your community. Set up a special HALF MEMBER ENROLLMENT DAY. The sponsor should again contact his applicant but in addition, a special invitation to complete the affiliation of the candidate into our fraternity is now available. Make a count of the HALF MEMBERS not enrolled—send this to the Conservation Dep't. here at Mooseheart and we will send you "half member" cards for local use.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

Good activities do not just happen. They are planned very carefully and the interest of every member is the first consideration. Each lodge has been furnished an activities calendar. **PLAN YOUR PROGRAM AND THEN WORK THE PLAN.**

How much use do you make of your building? Lodge quarters usually are well heated in winter, partially cooled in summer, at all times. Let's make use of this part of the overhead by planning some activity.

Contact some of the ladies groups such as Sewing Clubs, Red Cross Units, Bridge Clubs, etc. Offer your facilities to them. It may be the means of interesting their husband in joining your lodge.

Promote self education classes in afternoons or evenings. Brush up courses on typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, salesmanship, might help the ladies to better their income through part time work. Teachers can usually be found among Moose wives, retired office ladies, or school teachers. Evening classes in Algebra, English, Languages, and public speaking might be interesting to many of your members

if they realize they can help to improve their value to their employer by more knowledge.

Contact the hospitals, Doctors, Red Cross, in regards to a baby clinic for new mothers and fathers. Some members wife may be a registered nurse and would supervise this for nothing if she was helping her community.

Set up hobby groups within your lodge. Camera Clubs, amateur radio clubs, hunting and fishing groups, boating groups, all would function under the sponsorship of the lodge, but it should be understood, any financing of activities within each group should be done with no expense to the lodge, and all funds handled through the General Fund but earmarked for this groups use.

With a full activity program within the lodge, it will become second nature for members and their wives to desire to meet their acquaintances at the Moose. This sounds like a lot of work, but the cooperation of your membership, each of these items will function with little more than a guiding effort on the part of the officers. **REMEMBER**, we have a job to do, to sign new members, to keep these members paid up, to increase in stature the personality of each and every member. Be a leader, not a boss.
